

GURU GHASIDAS

Guru Ghashidas Vishwavidyalaya is named after Saint Guru Ghasidas (1756-1836), a visionary social reformer. Guru Ghasidas founded Satnam Panth, a socio-religious sect, which challenged contemporary discriminatory social order and advocated for social equality by refuting the exploitative and hierarchical caste system. With his holistic vision and systematic reforms, Guru Ghasidas contributed significantly in removing the prevailing social injustice and inequality.

Satnam Panth believes that truth is God and there is only one God, which is formless (nirgun) and infinite (anant). Individual reformation was brought by prohibiting consumption of liquor and non-vegetarian food. Guru Ghasidas also formulated principles, which show his love for fauna and his desire to put an end to cruelty towards animals. The partisans of Satnam Panth have been following these dictates from last hundreds of years now.

After its upgradation into a central university, many steps have been taken by the University authorities to translate Guruji's philosophy into reality. Now, our campus is an alcohol and tabacco free campus. Our vibrant university campus, where students from diverse castes, creeds and classes come together from all over India, provides an egalitarian environment based on Guruji's teaching.
