This course familiarizes students to the structure of Union Government as outlined in the Indian Constitution. <b>VIII</b>	Comparative Government & Politics Part II	<p><b>Course Objective:</b> This course will give knowledge to students about the constitutions of UK,USA, China, and Switzerland. X	International Relations Part-I	<p><b>Course Objective:</b> Course Objective: This paper seeks to equip students with the basic intellectual tools for understanding International Relations. It introduces students to some of the most important theoretical approaches for studying international relations. The course begins by historically contextualizing the evolution of the international state system before discussing the agency-structure problem through the</p>

		<p>levels-of-analysis approach. After having set the parameters of the debate, students are introduced to different theories in International Relations. It provides a fairly comprehensive overview of the major political developments and events starting from the twentieth century. Students are expected to learn about the key milestones in world history and equip them with the tools to understand and analyze the same from different perspectives. A key objective of the course is to make students aware of the implicit Euro - centricism of International Relations by highlighting certain specific perspectives from the Global South.</p> <p><b>Course Outcomes</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The students are given fundamental clarity about the concept of International Relations.</li> <li>• After Completing Graduation in the department students go for higher education. This course will provide conceptual understanding about various concepts in International Relations.</li> <li>• After Completion of course students will be able to understand the concepts of Foreign Policy.</li> </ul>
XI	Western Political Thought Part-I	<p><b>Course Objective:</b> This is a basic foundation course for students. Greek political thought: main features – Plato: justice, communism – Aristotle: state, classifications of constitutions. 2. Roman political thought: theories of Law and Citizenship – contributions of Roman thought. 3. Medieval political thought in Europe: major features. 4. Contribution of Machiavelli. Significance of Renaissance. Political thought of Reformation. Jean Bodin – Method, State, Sovereignty, Distinction between State and Government, Citizenship Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Summarize the passage of political thought through the classical, medieval and modern periods based on the works of Plato, Aristotle, and Machiavelli.</li> <li>• Compare and contrast the differences between Plato and Aristotle with regard to their understandings of the nature of the person, ethics, society, citizenship, and governance.</li> <li>• Explain the historical and intellectual context in which the political thought that helped to develop the modern state came to be.</li> <li>• Compare and contrast the concepts of justice, freedom, equality, citizenship, obligation and sovereignty in the works of Machiavelli and Bodin.</li> </ul>
XII	Political Sociology -Part- I	<p><b>Course Objective:</b> This course provides conceptual understanding to students about Political Sociology. The key aim of this course is to explain various social bases of politics. Emergence of Political Sociology. 2. Power-Authority. 3. Meaning and role of Bureaucracy. 4. Political culture and Political socialization: nature, types and agencies. 3. Political participation: concept and types. 4. Political Alienation and social change. 5. Political Dynamics: Interest Groups, Pressure Groups and Political Parties.</p> <p><b>Outcome:</b></p>

XVI	Western Political Thought Part-II	<p><b>Course Objective:</b> This course focuses upon modern western political thought. The basic focus of study is on individual thinkers whose ideas are however framed by specific themes. The course as a whole is meant to provide a sense of the broad streams of modern western political thought while encouraging a specific knowledge of individual thinkers and texts. This course starts with idea of origin of state on the basis of social contract and finished with Karl Marx's philosophy.</p> <p><b>Outcome:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A main key aim of this course is to introduce modern western philosophy of various political thinkers such as philosophy of Hobbes, Locke and Rousseau, J.S. Mill and Karl Marx.</li> <li>• Explain Karl Marx's worldview, with particular regard to his critique of capitalism, and state.</li> <li>• Explain John Stuart Mill's theory on utilitarianism and how he applies it to society and the state.</li> <li>• After finishing course, students will have conceptual clarity upon importance of state and its obligation.</li> </ul>
XVII	Political Sociology -Part- II	<p><b>Course Objective:</b> This course deal with various issues and conflict of society such as Social Asymmetries and Politics in India (Caste, Ethnicity), Gender and Politics in India, Protest and Change in India (working class and peasant movement), New Social Movements in India ( movements of ecology and anti-corruption), and Politics of Violence in India (Insurgency– Origin, Reasons, Expansion, State Response and Naxal Movement – Origin, Reasons, Expansion, State Response)</p>

Women and the Political Processes Part II	<p><b>Course Objective:</b></p> <p>This course opens up the question of women’s agency, taking it beyond ‘women’s empowerment’ and focusing on women as radical social agents. It attempts to question the complicity of social structures and relations in gender inequality. This is extended to cover new forms of precarious work and labour under the new economy. Special attention will be paid to feminism as an approach and outlook. This course is divided in to two sections. Section A is divided into three units. Unit One is about the idea of Patriarchy, its history, Sex-Gender Debates, women’s role in Public and Private sphere and Power. Unit Second is designed to understand the concept of Feminism. Unit third discusses on the concept of family, Community and State. Section B is also classified in 3 Unit. Unit four emphasizes on various Women’s movement in India. Unit five focuses on violence against women and Unit Six deal with issues on work and labour (visible and invisible work, reproduction &amp; care work, sex work).</p> <p><b>Course Outcomes:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The students are given fundamental clarity about different aspects of Feminism which are covered in the syllabi.</li> <li>• After Completing Graduation in the department students go for higher education.
