### ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

Guru Ghasidas Vishwavidyalaya, a Central University of India, is located in Bilaspur C.G. State, established under the Central Universities Act 2009, No. 25 of 2009. Formerly called as the Guru Ghasidas Vishwavidyalaya (GGV), it was established by an Act of the State Legislative Assembly, was formally inaugurated on June 16, 1983. GGV is an active member of the Association of Indian Universities and Association of Commonwealth Universities. Situated in a socially and economically challenged region, the university is appropriately named to honor the great Satnami Saint Guru Ghasidas who was born in 17th century, who championed the cause of the downtrodden and waged a relentless struggle against all forms of social evils and injustice prevailing in the society. The University is a residential cum affiliating institution, having its jurisdiction spread over Bilaspur Revenue Division of the state of Chhattisgarh. The city Bilaspur is well connected with all parts of the country by road, rail and air. Guru Ghasidas Vishwavidyalaya boast of a lush, green, sprawling main spread over an area of 875 acres (3.54km²), five kilometer from the main Bilaspur town. River Arpa, the lifetime of Bilaspur runs parallel to the university campus.

GGV is the leading Central University of India to implement National Education Policy 2020 in toto like Academic Bank of Credit (ABC), Multi- disciplinary and skill enhancement courses, compulsory internship and dissertation, experiential earning and integration of IKS in teaching and research. The Swabhiman Chhattisgarh and GGV Swabhiman Thali (G.S.T. Food Plate) seems to be unique program of the University. The University has also adopted part time and multi- disciplinary Ph.D. program.

### DEPARTMENT PROFILE

This department was established in the year 1989, the Department of Anthropology and Tribal Development is one of the oldest departments of the University. The establishment of the department bears a great significance in view of the fact that the State harbors a substantial number of tribal populations with diverse cultures. Anthropology as the science of the people has a strong commitment for the welfare and all round development of the weaker sections of the society of the state as well as of the country. The department aims to generate qualified, skillful and committed anthropologists to play a catalytic role as social advisers to policy makers in matters relating to various issues on tribal development. The department also emphasizes to study and suggests remedial measures with respect to eradication of hunger and malnutrition, the department offers admission to students for three years CBCS based B.A. /B.Sc. degrees (Six semesters) and Two years Master's programme (M.A/M.Sc.) in Anthropology for the entry of students directly. Realizing the contemporary relevance, the course for UG (Hons.) in anthropology has been upgraded with the incorporation of new papers which include Forensic Anthropology & Criminology, Research Methodology, Human Biology & Molecular Genetics, Tribal Development in India, Medical Anthropology, and Applied Anthropology etc. The M.A./M.Sc. Course in Anthropology is designed as (a) Compulsory Courses (Basics of Physical Anthropology, Fundamentals of Social Anthropology, Basics of Prehistoric Archaeology, Research Methodology, Practical's on (i) Somatometry and Somatoscopy and (ii) Prehistory and Museology (Semester-I); Human Genetics, Bio-social Problems of Indian Populations, Sociocultural Institutions, Indian Anthropology, Practicals on (i) Museology and (ii) Human Genetics (Semester-II) (b) Integrated / Inter disciplinary Course (Semester III & IV) (Ecological Anthropology/Medical Anthropology/Tribal Development) (c) Specialization / Elective Courses: (i) Social Anthropology & Tribal Development or (ii) Biological Anthropology & Human Genetics. The department laboratory is equipped with instrument to carry out practical classes on Anthropometry, Serology & Human Genetics, Dermatoglyphics, Axiology, and Body Composition. The department also has an ethnographic museum and archaeological museum. The department organizes student's seminar, exposure visits and having a library comprising of books on different sub-disciplines of anthropology. The department has introduced the course work for doctoral programme. The department has maintained a departmental library consisting of 2371 books and upgraded the department laboratory infrastructure such as anthropometer rod, Osteometry, Serological, Dermatoglyphics and human Osteological materials. The department is having an ethnographic museum containing material cultures of distinct tribes, collection of tool types belonging to prehistoric cultures and various types of rock specimens. The department has been undertaking students field studies among tribal groups of Chhattisgarh and Central India on several aspects of tribal life, culture and development such as: Material Culture, Social 2 Institution, Tribal development, Tribal Health and Nutrition, assess the impact of progressive Acts like PESA, MGNREGA, RTI, RTE, FRA etc. Department has also completed a number of research projects like Rehabitation and Displacement, Nutritional status of the Korbas, Tribal Indebtedness, Tribal Monographs and village studies. The Department is in close collaboration with the local NGOs, for productive research and development. Department has also organized a Refresher course in Anthropology and Sociology, memorial lectures, workshops and seminars. The department has published number of research articles, papers and books covering different areas of tribal communities of India. Students are assessed and evaluated throughout the semester by a continuous system of tests, seminars, assignments and end-semester examinations. Department is also providing coaching classes for PG level student to clear the UGC-NET examination.
